| Maths | RE/PSHE | Creative In art lessons, we will be focusing our learning around what sculptures are, who creates sculptures and making our very own. To make our sculptures we will be manipulating clay and using new tools to help enhance patterns and lines. The children will also be looking at an artist in depth - Yayoi Kusama. | |
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| As Poplar mathematicians, we will be revisiting numbers to 50. Once we have mastered these essential foundations we will be moving onto understanding the concepts of multiplication, division and fractions. We will introduce hese new concepts through the use of objects, pictures and real-life scenarios. We will also spend some time on Geometry and positional language. In Year One we count in multiples of 2s, 5s, and 10s; we will be working hard at mastering this skill over the new few weeks. | This term, in RE, we will be starting to explore different places of worship and look at what makes a place special or sacred. In PSHE our focus is relationships. We will be thinking about friendships; how to be a kind friend, how to solve disputes and how to show respect to others. | | |
| English | Science | Geography | |
| This term, in English, the children will be reading 'Don't Let the Pigeon Drive the Bus' and looking at persuasive language and techniques. Year 1 will write persuasive letters. In their letters, they will be using; exclamation marks to express emotion, list writing, conjunctions and adjectives. They will be expected to use their taught phonics and red words to write independently. We will then move on to look at Non-Fiction texts about lants and nature, with the end goal of the children creating and writing a non-chronological report. We will be reading lots of fiction and non-fiction books that link with our topic, including poetry in whole class reading, alongside our learning texts. | As Poplar scientists, we will be exploring the structure of plants and naming the different parts. We will also be exploring the local area to identify wild and garden flowers. This will be studied in conjunction with the exploration of mini- beasts, where we will observe and record the mini beasts that are in our local environment. We will use equipment to observe the structure of the animals and compare this to other animals we have studied. | In Geography, we will complete a weather log and look at the changes between the months and seasons. We will use observation skills, to explore the changes around us, and any signs of Spring/Summer we might find! | |
