Maths

To read and write numbers to 100 in numerals and in words.

To use place value and number facts to solve problems.

English

We are exploring a range of traditional and adapted fairy tales. We will identify key components of sentences and extend our sentences using expanded noun phrases. We will use our skills to adapt a well known fairy tale. We will also explore features of a poem and create a poem all about 'If I were in Charge of the World.'

Science

To explore and compare the differences between things that are living, dead, and things that have never been alive.

To identify that most living things live in habitats to which they are suited.

To identify and name a variety of plants and animals in their habitats.

Geography

To know what human and physical features are and be able to identify them in our local area.

To understand directional language and be able to apply it when referring to our local area.

To understand the differences between a city and countryside.

To know what techniques are used to create collage.

To investigate the works of Roberto Benavidez.

To use paper mâché to create sculpture.

To understand and use embellishments to improve art.

To understand why and how Muslims respect the Qur'an.

To understand the importance of the story 'The Night of Power'.

To know about the Muslim belief in one God.
